One of the most important - and overdue - developments of the last couple of months has been our Department-wide Parenting in Surgery initiative. There are many to thank for their leadership and hard work; in particular, it is important to recognize Drs. Lan Vu and Alexis Colley, as well as the Muriel Steele Society (led by Drs. Mika Varma and our Director for Gender Equity, Lucy Kornblith), working together collaboratively with the Office of Graduate Medical Education and the UCSF Lactation Accommodation Program. The new UCSF Department of Surgery 'Parenting in Surgery' website has launched; it will serve as a vital resource for trainees and faculty and highlights several initiatives. In short, UCSF Surgery has made a commitment to mitigate the physical and emotional demands of childbearing, childrearing, and parenting during surgical training. From pre-conception considerations to postpartum recovery and return to work, we have developed comprehensive guidelines and best practices that we call on all of our department to enthusiastically support. Our Guidelines on family leave for surgical trainees help decipher the American Board of Surgery's policy on family leave for surgical trainees both for residency and fellowship training. It may also help residents expecting to be new parents plan for their family leave time. The lactation wellness program policy aims to serve not only as practical advice to faculty, trainees, and staff but also as a statement of support for each person's family choices. Our lactation fund for trainees is a Departmental commitment to cover the expense of lactation supplies of up to \$500 per resident. And our new parent surgeons program is intended to foster mentoring relationships between parents and parents-to-be, helping to answer questions and address the anxiety that comes from navigating how best to balance new roles as parents with ambitions as surgeons. Our intent through the new parent mentorship program is for current parents (mothers AND fathers!) to offer experience-based support. This is a work in progress, informed by the feedback received.

As a reminder, we are excited to invite the department to attend the Parent Mentorship Program Launch Party on April 22 from noon to 2 pm at 'The Porch' in Spark Social. Dr. Amanda Sammann (PI) and Dr. Becca Plevin (Co-PI) in the Department of Surgery and Dr. Lauren Chalwell and Dr. Nancy Anaya in the Department of Emergency Medicine were awarded a three year \$3.77M California Violence and Prevention (CalVIP) Grant to support the Wraparound Project, a Hospital-Based Violence Intervention Program at the Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital and Trauma Center.

This funding will support the growth of the program through three aims: (1) Increase access to and engagement with WAP services through the implementation of a mobile app ("WrapApp"); (2) Increase access to and engagement with mental health services for victims of violence; (3) Strengthen leadership structure to enhance workflows, program evaluation, and gun violence research.

Clinical Trials Research Tips and Best Practices In this issue: New NIH Data Management & Sharing Policy

How we can help you meet this requirement!!!

The National Institutes of Health has issued a new Data Management & Sharing (DMS) Policy which took effect on January 25, 2023, with the goal of promoting the sharing of scientific data to facilitate the development of treatments and products that improve human health. Under this policy, NIH will require all researchers seeking grant funds that generate scientific data to submit a detailed 2-page Data Management and Sharing

Plan that outlines

- what data will be shared and when,
- how it will be managed and shared,
- how compliance will be monitored by the institution, and exactly where the data will be made available.



The expiring 2003 policy only applies to grants requesting more than **\$500,000** of direct costs in a single year, whereas the new 2023 policy removes this threshold and applies to any research funded in whole or in part by NIH. Grant proposals should include allowable costs associated with data curation, management, and data preservation and repositories.

We honor a trail-blazing group at UCSF Medical Center that became the first all-female surgical team to perform a heart transplant this past December. Among the eight women, several of whom are not pictured they had performed thousands of complex surgical procedures during their careers. But when they were randomly assigned to the heart transplant, they unwittingly made history.

This is not the first milestone for women in medicine at UCSF. Fiedler explains that our previous chair of the department of surgery at UCSF, Dr. Nancy Ascher, is the first woman to ever perform a liver transplant.

The study "Cancer Screening after the Adoption of Paid-Sick-Leave Mandates" has found more people get screened for cancer when employers are mandated to provide paid sick leave. "The largest coverage expansion came in 2015 when California mandated paid sick leave for 7 million

workers." By the end of 2022, nearly 20 million workers in the U.S gained paid-sick-leave coverage.

Envision is an internship program in partnership with the UCSF Department of Neurosurgery and the non-profit organization Oasis for Girls to expose young high school girls of color from under-represented communities in San Francisco to careers in medicine and health-science fields, as well as to help them build important professional skills to enrich their future.
